The Creative Solutions:

Preschool through second grade made substantial adjustments within their classrooms in order to welcome back their classes. However, the full classes in grades third - eighth demanded major reworking. Mrs. Noall (third), Ms. Sebahar (fourth) and Ms. Gehrig (fifth) committed to leading teams, splitting their classes into two rooms AND zooming home learners. All used their regular classrooms, then half of third was in the art room, half of fourth in the library and half of fifth in the Vaughan Center.







Student Leadership Council candidates shared speeches on Flipgrid and created flyers which were posted around the school. Our Student Leadership Council used Flipgrid throughout the year to regularly communicate with each class about our monthly service project, virtue focus and Tiger Tuesday themes.

Middle school started the year in a hybrid model (1/2 the class in person, ½ Zooming from home for two days a week and alternating Fridays), with each class also having full time home learners. We adjusted drop off/pick up routines. Our new lunch plan guaranteed 6 feet of distance when face masks were removed. Before the first day of school our County Health liaison toured the campus and affirmed protocols are in place for as safe an opening as possible. Our first week of school schedule was altered to allow for necessary protocol implementation. August 18 was our all day, small group, Meet the Teacher event. August 19th was the first day of school for half the students, the other half attended on the 20th. August 21st first home learner materials pick up in the gym for 30+ students. Weekly materials pick up/drop off continued throughout the year. Teachers recorded videos and then Zoomed with parents for Back to School Night.

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September

Salt Lake City moved to the yellow COVID risk level phase, which changed group size guidelines. Planning began for all middle schoolers to be on campus everyday. On September 8th hurricane level winds took out our power and exposed gaps in our emergency alert system which we addressed. The fifth grade group in the Vaughan Center were without power for three days, undeterred their work continued. We celebrated our first Mass with the middle school on September 11th. The Book Bag program with COVID adaptations started up, providing weekly independent reading level books for grades kindergarten - fifth grade. HSA meetings began on Zoom, parent volunteers were welcomed for lunch recess duty, and parents began generously providing monthly teacher lunches. Our first service project was collecting donations for Berry Creek Elementary which was devastated by the California wildfires. Parent teacher conferences were held through Zoom and families participated in our first virtual book fair with The Story Cupboard.

Art Teacher Grace Cier and all Cosgriff students began working on a year long project. Postcards were created for fall, Christmas and Easter, which were mailed to the grandparents and friends of Cosgriff to remind them that near or far they are always in our hearts. The beautiful background art through out the newsletter is from these projects.

October

The month began with a First Communion Mass for Spring 2020 First Communicants who had postponed the sacrament. By the end of first quarter we executed a new plan which allowed all students to be on campus everyday. Sixth grade, whole group, moved into the Vaughan Center.

Eighth grade, whole group, moved into the St. Ambrose Social Hall (church basement) and seventh grade was split between two middle school classrooms. Fifth grade remained split between their classroom and one of the middle school classrooms. We happily ended the middle school hybrid plan and the students' regular moving of their books and materials. However, the demands on our technology led to upgrades for our network firewall and middle school WiFi to address immediate needs.





Our October service project supported Five for the Fight. Students brought in donations in honor of loved ones who have fought cancer.

On Halloween, students wore their costumes to school and we shared a recording of our Halloween parade.

Later in the afternoon we had our first Boo Thru, a drive thru Halloween celebration.









NOVEMBER

On November 2nd our important Power Hour program, K - 5 small group literacy work, COVID edition began. Eighth grade service at the Food Bank continued with ½ class groups. Grandparent tribute videos and slideshows were shared as well as the Shop our Village promotion. New cameras and technology in the church supported



streaming of school Masses to the whole school. Each class filled multiple Thanksgiving food boxes for St. Patrick's Parish. From the beginning of the year, Coronavirus exposures, testing and quarantines were regular occurrences. Our first positive case in the school was in November, which is also when the governor issued an Executive Order State of Emergency. Throughout the second and third quarter our



COVID response, communications and impact was pushed to the next level. At this time almost every other Catholic school had a four day school week for this COVID year, while J.E. Cosgriff maintained our five day school week. However, in November we announced the need to take off two extra days at Thanksgiving, and one Friday a month in December, January, and February. These Fridays to Thrive allowed faculty and staff to regroup and turned into key vaccine days in 2021.

December

The Advent season inspired a new tradition of decorating our entrance windows for the season. As a school we focused on gratitude and preparing for our first recorded Christmas program. The first graders once again helped us all focus on the true meaning of Christmas with their Nativity presentation. Mrs. Lacombe's kindergarten also recorded their annual performance of the Polar Express. The school participated in the Knights of Columbus "Keep Christ in Christmas" poster contest and the eighth grade submitted entries in the Catholic citizenship essay contest. The health department announced a substantial change to school quarantine policy. The change recognized that mask to mask exposures in school limited spread and therefore we would not need to quarantine students, although we would continue informing classes of cases. We went into Christmas break with teachers sharing their favorite Christmas books in the "Twelve Stories of Christmas" and we looked forward to the gift of vaccines.

Hundreds of ziplock bags were filled with Valentines for care centers in the St. Ambrose Parish ministry, our local firehouse, the YWCA, and our neighbors. Classes shared presentations about their school day, we celebrated 100 days of in person learning and we had a school presentation Mass for our eighth grade Confirmation candidates. The busyness of the first week of February continued with our Mardi Gras Bingo, Zoomed into all the classrooms, followed of course by Ash Wednesday Mass.

COVID Report:

During the 2020-2021 school year we had around 400 individuals from 2 year olds to over 65 coming and going from our campus. Over the course of the year there were 15 student COVID cases and 8 adult cases reported to the administration, even though not all involved a school exposure or contact tracing. All of the adult cases and 13 of the student cases were reported from November to January. The student cases were spread across preschool - eighth grade. There were quarantines/testing following health department policy, but no closures or whole class quarantines. The quarantines ended once the policy changed so that mask to mask exposures did not require quarantines. Thankfully, there were no hospitalizations, but there have been COVID long haul health impacts for adults in our community which we pray resolve. This brief overview represents hours and hours of contact tracing, phone calls, emails and risk mitigation among all of our stakeholders. We worked through anxiety and questions as calmly as possible for the common good.

May

MARDI GRAS in MAY finally arrived on May 1st. As with many events of this year there had to be a substantial change to our major fundraiser. Moving Mardi Gras to May did not allow us to host an in person event, but we were able to work together for a successful live virtual event that exceeded our fundraising goal. Our Crown Burger VI Opportunity Drawing was a particularly wild Venmo ride raising over \$24,000. The kindergarten class ultimately came out on top earning the Crown Burger VI Picnic. Another success was our virtual paddle raise for classroom upgrades and a schoolwide update to the tech infrastructure.





Our parents and students provided a packed
Teacher Appreciation Week which was the perfect
boost we needed for the busy month of May. Eighth
graders recorded their first Poetry Out Loud
presentations and Mrs. Lacombe's kindergarten
also shared their year-long poetry work. The Tiger
Track Meet was a wonderful Saturday morning
gathering. One of our most gratifying results from
our end of the year assessments showed 92% of our
kindergarten - fifth graders reading at or above
grade level. This reflects the commitment of students,
parents and faculty to literacy growth. Nineteen of our
eighth graders celebrated the sacrament of

parents and faculty to literacy growth. Nineteen of our eighth graders celebrated the sacrament of Confirmation. Third, fourth and fifth grade families were invited to participate in a Sunday afternoon Amazing Race, recognizing the value of perseverance and working together.

Graduation activities began with the kindergarten - seventh grade lining the halls and the front of the school for a joyful 'clap out' before their last school Mass. At the end of Mass the kindergarteners performed a song in their honor. This was followed by the traditional 7th/8th grade Court of Honor-this year held on our outdoor sport court. The next day the eighth grade handily beat the faculty in volleyball before cleaning up their classroom in the church Social Hall, making hundreds of peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for the Good Samaritan program, helping classroom teachers and delivering flowers to our neighbors. Then the class went to Sugarhouse Park for lunch and activities before returning for a class slide show and memory books. The evening graduation ceremony was held in St. Ambrose Church, with excellent messages from Father Erik, alum Darnell Crandall and Student Leadership Council President Zach Farr. Following the ceremony eighth grade families provided a lively outdoor celebration on our sport court and field.





Field Day - COVID Edition kept students in their class cohorts, providing fun activities and of course a popsicle for all. Our end of the year Honors Assembly was attended by fourth - seventh grade and streamed to the rest of the school. The last day ended joyously with music filling the air to celebrate the final pick up of our extraordinary, ordinary year.

Summer

Shortly after the last day of school, we happily moved all of the furniture from the Social Hall and Vaughan Center back to the school. The art room has been returned to an art room, and the library is again the library. Both spaces were used during June for the Cosgriff Summer Program. Our reading team offered take home book bags for interested kindergarten - fourth grade families. The second annual Kindergarten - eighth grade Tiger Lit Summer Challenge was shared and our Cosgriff Summer Program ran for four weeks in June. In July our technology backbone was completely rebuilt. A few highlights of the project are the previously daisy chained switches are now home run 10 gigabyte fiber to the main distribution frame. Along with access point uniformity and upgrades our security and traffic management has substantially improved. We look forward to filling our classrooms and returning to work.
